PSCI 3313: Classical and Medieval Political Philosophy

Course Description:

This course is designed to present a survey and analysis of the highlights of political thought, theory, and political philosophy from classical Greece through Medieval Europe.

Learning Objectives and Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of the course, it is expected that the student should be able to:

- 1. Articulate, first and foremost, the general meaning and scope of political philosophy and political thought, and further, he or she should be able to distinguish between the two terms
- 2. Confront and attempt to answer the most basic questions that human beings can ask about living together—questions about justice and questions about relations and institutions of power.
- 3. Understand and articulate to an acceptable degree the political philosophies, thought, and theories of the major thinkers selected.

Major Political Philosophers:

Different professors will often choose different giants of classical and later political philosophy in designing this course, but the following is a list of those most commonly read and discussed for this course: Plato, Aristotle, St. Augustine, and St. Thomas Aquinas.
