Description: This course is an intense analysis of federal and state court decisions that interpret the United States Constitution as to the authority and process of criminal justice agencies. Topics include a historical overview, detention, arrest, search and seizure, interrogations and confessions, selfincrimination, due process, and right to counsel, trial, and punishment, etc. Prerequisite for CRIJ Majors: Successful completion of 12 lower-level CRIJ required courses. Prerequisite for non-CRIJ majors: Twelve hours of social sciences outside of CRIJ. Interchangeable with PSCI 4311.

Justification: Currently, the criminal justice core requires four courses related to legal issues. This is very off balanced when compared to the other core content areas identified by the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences (ACJS) as important for criminal justice majors. We are thus proposing that based on the fact that criminal justice already incorporates legal issues in other core courses, PSCI 4311 and PSCI 4312 should no longer be required courses for CRIJ majors. However, if students wish to take more legal courses as electives, they may take CRIJ 4311 (which is interchangeable with PSCI 4311). Additionally based on the demand for PSCI 4311/4312 by CRIJ students, the course will be taught on a more regular basis by CRIJ faculty.

REQUIREMENTS

- 2. To analyze judicial and legal issues concerning constitutional law in the criminal justice system
- 3. To study key cases, legal terms, clauses, and chronologies in constitutional law
- 4. To articulate informed opinion over important, controversial, constitutional issues
- 5. To examine the historical evolution of constitutional doctrines, standards, and tests
- 6. To appreciate the scholarly study of constitutional law and its application
- 7. To recognize important considerations dealing with civil rights and liberties
