Course Description: Laboratory experience for students who participate in speech activities.

This course introduces the students to various argumentation techniques. The student will learn basic research skills and methods of cataloging evidence. The student will learn to organize and present ideas in effective communication paradigms. Individual debate and team formats will be demonstrated. College level development of sound arguments and reasoning including the effective incorporation of evidence for the purpose of debate.

Prerequisite: Instructor signature required **Lecture hours**: 1 credit hour

Justification: This course would help to attract students to the Forensics activity. This course would expose and prepare the students for collegiate Speech and Debate competitions. Students will learn about and prepare for competitive events in interpretive, impromptu, extemporaneous, and platform events. Students would also prepare for debate competitions. It would also give the students who are currently participating in the Forensics activity an opportunity to receive credit hours for their participation in the organization. This course introduces students to various argumentation and interpretive techniques. The student will learn basic research skills and methods of cataloging evidence. The student will learn to organize and present ideas in effective communication paradigms. Students will participate in individual debate and team formats. Students will be able to develop sound arguments and reasoning. This would include learning how to effectively incorporate evidence into oral presentations for the purpose of debate. Students will be able to demonstrate through performance the importance of both verbal and nonverbal communication. Finally, students will be able to research and utilize literature specific to their chosen theme. This will help promote the Communication program. This course can be repeated multiple times for students participating in the TAMIU Forensics Forum.
