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**ENGL 5302**  
**Introduction to the Profession**  
**Three semester hours**

This course provides intensive training in graduate-level writing, research, publication, conferences, interviewing and related topics, and is directed primarily, but not exclusively, toward students interested in continuing on to a Ph.D. program.

**Learning Outcomes:**

- Students who successfully complete this course will be able to effectively navigate the university library, both on line and at the library itself.
- Students will know how to access and evaluate multiple online databases, do Boolean searches, quickly find and retrieve articles from both online and on-campus scholarly journals, and find other useful hard-copy sources to support their scholarly research.
- In addition, students will know how to shop their research manuscripts out to relevant scholarly journals and to search effectively for “calls for manuscripts.”
- Students will learn effective interviewing skills and will do at least one mock interview.
- Students will have written and expanded one 6,000-word scholarly article that could be eligible for submission to one relevant scholarly journal to be considered for publication.
