Also, quasi-judicial and extra-judicial features ~~are covered as well as principles of evidence that pertain to the criminal justice process including the nature and types of criminal evidence and admissibility of evidence in court.~~

Justification for changes: We would like to change the title and description of the course to (1) better distinguish it from CRIJ 2329 (Fundamentals of Criminal Law) and (2) allow us to cover principles of criminal evidence which no other undergraduate courses currently includes. We also would like to remove the requirement of permission from the CRIJ advisor as it is a substitution of a 4000 level course for a 1000 level course. Other substitutions of 4000 for 1000 level courses, in our program, do not require the permission of the CRIJ advisor.
