The primary focus of the MA Sociology program is applied sociology. The primary goals of the program will focus on job skills. The TAMIU applied Sociology program is designed for faculty and students to actively engage in "hands-on" research that is relevant to communities they study. The skills we teach are valuable to the community organizations.

Graduates from our program will be trained in survey methodology, needs assessment, grant writing, professional report writing and evaluation scholarship. These skills are sought after by governmental agencies, research institutes, and community nonprofit organizations. Students will also develop a strong academic background that will prepare them for the Ph.D. programs.
