CHANGES: ENGL 3310: Young Adult Literature. Revised description on page 2. This course covers the literature written for young adults (YAs) for adolescents and analyzes how this literature meets the varying developmental stages of YAs. includes generic (poetry, drama, fiction) and thematic considerations as well as a historical perspective. The subtitle of this course could easily be "YAs and the literature that meets their needs what to read and ways to read it." Students will spend the semester: (1) reading plowing through a wealth of texts (of various genres and mediums); (2) responding to and analyzing those texts in writing; (3) based on well-accepted theories of developmental stages, drawing connections between talking about those texts and the YAs young adults who might (or might not) choose to read them; and (4) developing creative methods of thinking about productive ways to linking up YAs with texts that they will find interesting, informative and provocative. This course follows the principle of "learning by doing", so students will conduct numerous individual and group assignments typically required of YAs, thus providing future educators a first-hand opportunity to develop a teaching philosophy regarding using YA literature in the classroom. Students will also consider strategies for incorporating literature in a multitude of curriculum areas. While students need not be education majors, the course is taught with the assumption that students taking it will, one day, be teachers themselves. Prerequisite: Three hours sophomore literature or consent of instructor.
