NURS 4340 Global Health Three semester hours, theory only. (SP)

This capstone course brings together content from the entire nursing curriculum to examine global health problems and challenges within the context of current geo-political-social-cultural-economic- Environmental-international health realities. Looking at health and health care as a basic human right, students will explore basic health-related concepts and trends within a global context. Immigration, socioeconomic conditions, and environmental factors will be analyzed in relationship to health and health care delivery. Students will examine multinational corporate activities, the social and health consequences of armed conflict and rapid development, and the ways in which cultural and religious practices and beliefs may be detrimental to an individual's health. This is a WIN course. To earn credit, this course must be completed with a grade of "C" or better.

## **NURS 4340: Global Health Nursing**

This capstone course brings together knowledge and experiences from the entire nursing curriculum to examine Global Health problems and challenges within the context of current realities. Looking at health and health care as a basic human right, students will explore health-related concepts and trends within a global context. Geopolitical, immigration, socioeconomic conditions, and environmental factors will be analyzed in relation to health and health care delivery. Students will examine multinational corporate activities, the social and health consequences of armed conflict and rapid development, and the ways in which cultural and religious practices and beliefs may influence an individual's health or potential for recovery. (WIN)

**Course Objectives:** Upon completion of this course, students will have had the opportunity to:

- 1. Explore current geo-political-social-cultural-economic-international realities as a basis for understanding Global Health issues and their relationship to nursing knowledge and practice. (1, 2, 7, 8, 9)
- 2. Evaluate the role(s) of nurses as individuals and a profession in improving the health status of the global "community", areas of which are being challenged by rapid growth and/or development, environmental deterioration, uncontrolled migration and increasing privatization of basic resources. (6, 7, 8, 9)
- 3. Create a proposal for behavior change by applying critical decision making, clinical judgment, problem solving and the research process in the development of a nursing assessment and plan for aggregate level intervention to reduce health disparities. (3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 10)
- 4. Analyze variables of economic growth and/or migration, relatively open borders, and crossnational collaboration on the health status of diverse populations on both sides of selected international borders. (2, 7)
- 5. Use a comprehensive explanatory model to demonstrate and evaluate the influence of societal factors on health care status as measured by standardized rates used in global health. (1, 3, 7)
- 6. Articulate an understanding of and personal commitment to the World Health Organization's goal of *Health for All* in the context of increasing globalization and the growing gap between developed and developing nations. (8, 9)
