We distinguish between the assessment assignment and course assignment. Each section of PSCI is comparable to each other although tests and writing assignments may vary in length and in focus areas of American National Government.

Inclusion in the core is contingent upon the course being offered and taught at least once every other academic year. Courses will be reviewed for renewal every five (5) years.

The department understands that instructors will be expected to provide student work and to participate in university-wide assessments of student work. This could include, but may not be limited to, designing instruments such as rubrics, and scoring work by students in this or other courses.
