Program Admission Requirements

- Apply via <u>applytexas.org</u>.
- Submit official transcript(s) from every college or university attended.
- Submit student 300-word narrative/essay.
- Submit official GRE/GMAT scores (if applicable).
- Completion of four prerequisites undergraduate courses (with a grade of "B" or better): PSYC 3302, PSYC 4301. PSYC 4303, and PSYC 4308.
- Three letters of recommendation.
- Interview
- International students must also submit:
 - Official Certificate of Graduation
 - · TOEFL or IELTS scores
 - Financial Statement Form
 - · Letter of Sponsorship
 - · Bank Statement.

The application deadline is April 30 (domestic/international).
