## NFNP 5608 Management of Acute and Chronic Illness, Part 1 Six semester hours, three theory, nine clinical.

This course focuses on the clinical management of commonly occurring acute and chronic conditions in health care settings. Content includes symptom complexes, pathophysiology, epidemiology, clinical management, and prevention of complications. Emphasis is on symptom analysis, diagnostic reasoning, differential diagnosis, and prescription of therapeutic regimens. Attention is given to evidence-based pharmacological and nonpharmacological treatments, and integration of nursing, developmental, family and transcultural theories to the diagnostic and management process. The clinical practice provides the opportunity for the student to perform comprehensive and episodic assessments, demonstrate advanced skills in health assessments, diagnose commonly occurring illnesses, and suggest treatments and referrals under supervision. Prerequisite: NFNP 5407.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

Upon completion of the course the student will be able to:

- 1. Treat common acute and chronic physical and mental illnesses and common injuries in people of all ages to minimize the development of complications, and promote functional outcomes and quality of life. (1, 2)
- 2. Recognize acute exacerbations of chronic illness and intervene appropriately while attending to the patient's response to the illness experience. (2)
- 3. Integrate appropriate nonpharmacologic treatment modalities into a plan of care. (2)
- 4. Adapt care to meet the complex needs of patients arising from age changes and multiple system disease. (1, 2, 5)
- 5. Evaluate results of interventions using accepted outcome criteria, revise the plan accordingly, and consult/refer when needed. (2, 4)
- 6. Prioritize health problems and intervene appropriately including initiation of effective emergency care. (1, 2, 3, 5)
- 7. Assess, diagnose, monitor, coordinate, and manage the health/illness status of patients over time and support the patient through the end-of-life process. (1, 2, 4, 5)
- 8. Collaboratively assess, plan, implement, and evaluates primary care with members of the health care team using approaches that recognize each one's expertise to meet the comprehensive needs of patients. (1, 2, 4, 6)
- 9. Educate patients for self-management of acute/chronic illness with sensitivity to the patient's learning ability and cultural/ethnic background. (2, 4)
- 10. Schedule follow-up visits to appropriately monitor patients and evaluate their response to health/illness care. (1, 3)
