## Justification:

This course will provide students with a unique introduction to the crime that occurs in the wake of disasters. It will challenge students to think critically about the conditions that facilitate various types of post-disaster crime and aid students in understanding the difficulty of conceptualizing and measuring crime in the wake of a disaster. This course exposes students to the reality of post-disaster criminogenic behavior and how both domestic and international law enforcement, security and other agencies can both better respond to and attempt to prevent this crime. Importantly, this course adds to a growing list of advanced electives available to undergraduate criminal justice (and other) majors.
