Three semester hours. (FL/SP/SS). An intensive study of import procedures, international trade terms and applications; practices and processes of import management operations, including government controls and compliance. Skill development in the preparation and understanding of import documents such as customs invoices, packing lists, and commercial invoices.

Prerequisite:

Graduate standing

Course Goals: The goals of this course are to provide students with a fundamental understanding of import operations, and as well as the best practices of shipping and documentation procedures for international transactions. This course has been designed to prepare the student for effectively managing customs related issues, whenever they may happen. Although we are relying on U.S. Customs law, most of the laws we will review are applicable to most World Trade Organization (WTO) member countries. When you finish this course you will be prepared to effectively deal with your customhouse broker and should be able to assist in your own importation processes.

Learning Objectives: Upon completion of this course the student should be able to:
1. Demonstrate knowledge of the practical aspects of import management (shipping and documentation procedures) by and for international businesses.

- 2. Demonstrate effective knowledge of the selection of business partners: sellers and buyers, carriers and service providers; who are compatible with the organization's objectives.
- 3. Demonstrate competent knowledge of government regulations that can impact import operations.
- 4. Competently demonstrate and communicate the basic knowledge of import operations in a project report to be developed individually during the semester;

This project report must comply with the essentials of academic writing, and should be reviewed by TAMIU Writing Center before submission. The learning objectives are measurable through exams, assignments, research projects and reports, and class participation.

Topical coverage includes import transactions, logistics and transportation issues for import managers, International trade (pricing and terms of sales), e-commerce, starting an import business, global supply chains (international logistics and international documents), import operations (homeland security, C-TPAT program, import strategies, NAFTA and the WTO issues/regulations.

Classroom Behavior

Copyright Restrictions

The Copyright Act of 1976 grants to copyright owners the exclusive right to reproduce their works and distribute copies of their work. Works that receive copyright protection include published works such as a textbook. Copying a textbook without permission from the owner of the copyright may constitute copyright infringement. Civil and criminal penalties may be assessed for copyright infringement. Civil penalties include damages up to \$100,000; criminal penalties include a fine up to \$250,000 and imprisonment.

Copyright laws generally do not allow students and professors to make photocopies of copyrighted materials, except they may copy a limited portion of a work, such an article from a journal or a chapter from a book for their own personal academic use or, in the case of a professor, for personal, limited classroom use. In general, the extent of such copying should not suggest that the purpose or the effect of your copying is to avoid paying for the materials. And, of course, these copies may not be sold for a profit. Thus, students who copy textbooks to avoid buying them or professors who provide photocopies of textbooks to enable students to save money are violating the law.

Plagiarism and Cheating

Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's work as one's own. Recently, the Internet has complicated the picture. Getting something from the Internet and presenting it as one's own is still plagiarism. Copying another student's paper or a portion of the paper - is usually called "copying". Neither plagiarism nor copying will be tolerated. Should a faculty member discover that a student has committed plagiarism, the students will be subject to discipline, and may receive a grade of 'F' in that course and the matter may be referred to the TAMIU Honor Council for possible disciplinary action.
