Title: Studies in Shakespeare

Measurable Student Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Examine the historical, social, and cultural contexts of texts;
- 2. Evaluate the significance of Shakespeare's works in light of current research;
- 3. Integrate primary and secondary sources into writing effectively and ethically;
- 4. Compose texts that effectively address audience, purpose, style, and content. (This includes: clear focus, structurally unified development of ideas, appropriate rhetorical style, correct use of Standard American Academic English (SAAE), and ethically appropriate use of research).

SCH Value: 3

Description: This course is designed to explore special topics, themes, or issues in Shakespearean studies. Students will practice interpreting Shakespeare's work in light of cultural and social contexts of Shakespeare's England and within current research in the field. May be repeated once when topic changes.

Prerequisite: Three hours of sophomore literature.

Justification: This course offers students an opportunity to study Shakespeare's with intense focus on a topic(s), theme(s), or issue(s). This course will also be among options in the English BA and BA with certification for the "Shakespeare" requirement, allowing greater flexibility and choice for students to complete this requirement in the major. This additional course will allow students with a keen interest in Shakespeare to have another opportunity to study his work in depth.
