Title: History of US Workers

Measurable Student Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

1. Explain the principle factors that have shaped the economic and work experience of US workers from the colonial period to modern times
2. Analyze primary sources related to US labor history
3. Synthesize historiographical perspectives and understandings of the US workers' experience

SCH Value: 3

Description: This course describes and analyzes the history of US workers from the colonial period to the present. Topics include economic development, migration and immigration, race and ethnicity, slave and free labor, and the activities and fortunes of the American labor union movement in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Prerequisite: HIST 1301 and 1302

Justification: This course provides students with the opportunity to examine the factors, people, and events that have shaped the economic and professional environment they live in today. Students with an interest in studying business and the practice and theories of manufacturing and trade may find this course especially useful.
