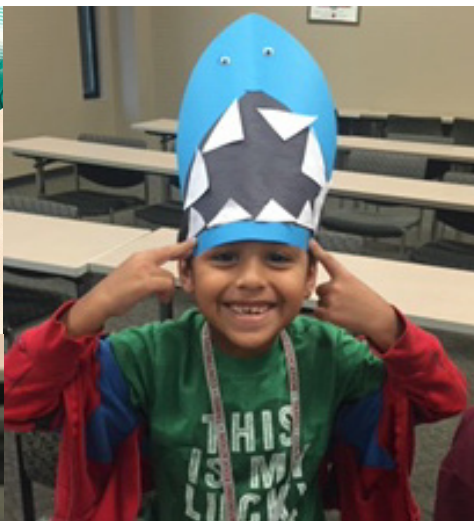
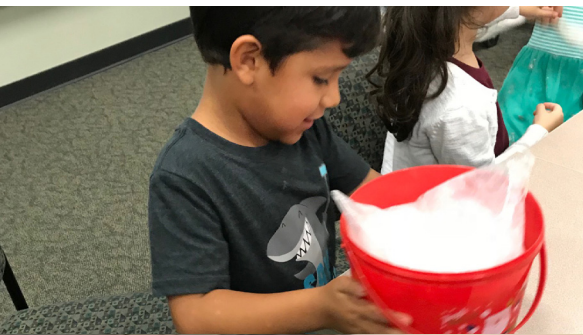

Dates:

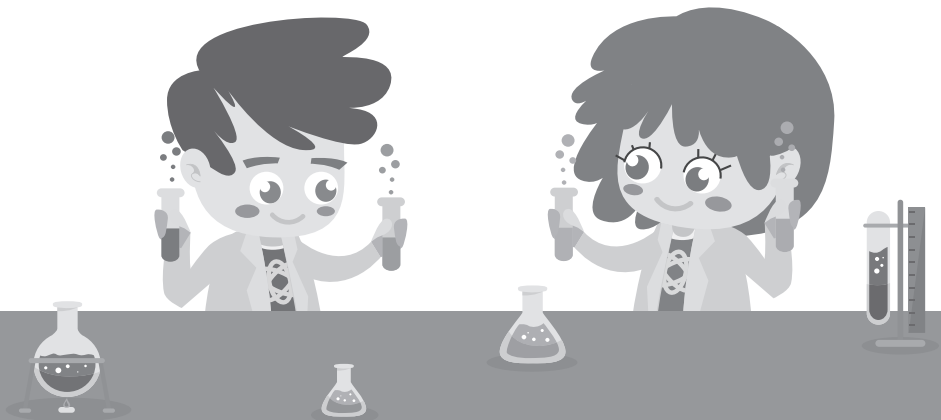
Dusty's Junior University Camp will be held from **June 3 to July 25** (Mondays – Thursdays) with the option to sign-up for two week sessions. Tuition Fees cover the cost of the full day (Four courses per session).

- **Session 1: June 3 – 13**
- **Session 2: June 17 – 27**
- **Session 3: July 1 – 11**
- **Session 4: July 15 – 25**

- Drop off: 7:45 – 8:00 a.m.
- Pick up: 3:30 – 3:45 p.m.
- Aftercare: 3:30 – 5:30 p.m.

[Please Note: If your child is not picked up by 3:45 p.m. we will send them to Aftercare for a fee unless otherwise advised. Sign in/out children in the Office of Continuing Education located in **Student Center 119** outside of Drop-off and Pick-up times.]



POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

DROP OFF AND PICK UP PROCEDURES

1. Parents need to fill out the “Student Registration Form” to provide information on who will be dropping off/picking up children from the camp.
2. We request 2 primary pickup designees and 1 emergency pick up designee.
3. The designated drop off/pick up location is the curve in front of the Student Center for all students for both morning and afternoon.
 - a. First day of camp TAMIU PD will be directing traffic.
4. DROP OFF TIME: 7:45 AM – 8:00 AM
5. The students must be received and acknowledged by a Dusty’s Junior U Camp staff member.
6. Late arrivals: must be escorted by parent to **STC 119**.
 - a. Parents must sign student in with Program Aide
7. STUDENTS ARE TO BE PICKED UP NO LATER THAN 3:45 PM unless in Aftercare.
8. Aftercare: Parents are to sign out their children in the **Student Center room 119**. Children picked up after end time of 5:30 p.m. will be charged a fee.

CLASS SCHEDULES

1. Class changes will not be made during camp.
2. Class size is limited to 20 students no exceptions.
3. Once 20 students are signed up, the system will not allow any further registrations.
4. If class does not make, we will select a class for the camper.

DRESS CODE

1. Summer Camp participants are NOT allowed to wear short shorts, tank tops or spaghetti straps. T-shirts must have appropriate logos. If dress code is violated, parents will be called to bring an appropriate change of clothes.
2. No flip-flops due to risk of tripping and falling.

EARLY RELEASE/EMERGENCIES

1. Parents/Guardian must report to the Office of Continuing Education located in the **Student Center Room 119** if picking up their child early. Manager or Coordinators will be contacted to bring child/children to the office. ****Parents are NOT allowed to go near or into the classrooms** due to TAMIU Campus Programs for Minor Policies.
2. **Parents MUST sign out their child before taking them home.**
3. Call the Office of Continuing Education if you need to get in contact with your child and we will get your student to call from a university phone.
 - a. In the event of an emergency situation we will immediately contact you.
 - b. If your child is feeling ill, we will take him/her to Health Services and you will be contacted.
 - c. Be aware that if this happens you may have to come pick up your child. Additionally, no medicine can be administered to your child.
4. Ensure medical information is complete and accurate and all relevant information is provided to staff for the campers well-being.

VISITING POLICIES

Parents will be allowed to have lunch with their children but must meet the following requirements:

- Parents/visitors must **sign out** their children with their assigned Classroom Aide.
- Parents/visitors must **sit with their child** separated from the rest of the campers (due to safety reasons).
- Parents/visitors **must return** their child back to their assigned Classroom Aide and sign them back in.
- Please **follow** the scheduled lunch time. We ask that you avoid time conflicts with scheduled classes. Do not go over allotted lunch time.

If you need to communicate with your child, you will need to come by the office first and then we will call for your child to be brought to the office. Arrangements should be made prior to start of camp if child/children will be visited frequently.

WHAT TO BRING

1. Students **MUST** bring a packed lunch if they are not purchasing meal packages. We are not responsible for lost change. Therefore we do not allow the use of cash to purchase food/snacks.

2. **SNACKS:** Students are allowed and encouraged to bring a snack for the morning & afternoon; lunch will be after 11:00 AM for Kinder and at 11:30 AM for elementary and middle school. Under our regulations, children must be monitored at all times throughout the day. Therefore, classroom aides do not have time to take children to purchase a snack from the vending machine. Additionally, money can be misplaced.

a. **Important:** NO SHARING! It is important you let your children know that no sharing is allowed for health safety purposes. Some children may have food allergies.

3. We encourage students to bring a water bottle to refill throughout the day. Keep in mind that Laredo summers are very hot. Please send your children with WATER bottles to help us keep your children hydrated.

4. All class materials will be provided by the Office of Continuing Education to use in class time.

LUNCH PROCEDURES

1. Students will have **2 options** for lunch: Bring their own lunch from home or purchase a meal plan through the Office of Continuing Education.

2. Students with a meal plan will be walked by a teacher aide to the food court and will guide them in choosing their meals. Teacher Aides will monitor camp participants at lunch.

3. Meal plan must be purchased before camp sessions start.

a. **Deadline** for the month of June will be **May 27th**

b. **Deadline** for the month of July will be **June 27th**.

4. Emergency vouchers (if required) can be purchased at a rate of \$10.00/day.

If no lunch is brought from home, your child will be provided a voucher and you will be charged \$10

Pack full lunch as well as snacks. The day is long for campers.

ELECTRONICS

1. Electronics such as cell phones, iPads, iPods, Nooks, DS, PSP, etc. are **not allowed** during classroom time.

If a student pulls out a cell phone or other electronic device during class, it will be confiscated and will be returned at the end of the day. Parents will also be notified.

2. We are not responsible for any lost or stolen items. Our focus is on the Camp participants' safety and learning environment.

AFTERCARE

Students will watch a movie, eat popcorn, play board games, or do other planned activities during this time.

- 2 weeks before first day of Camp - 40% refund
- 1 week before first day of Camp - 15% refund
- 1st day of Camp and any time after first day - No Refund

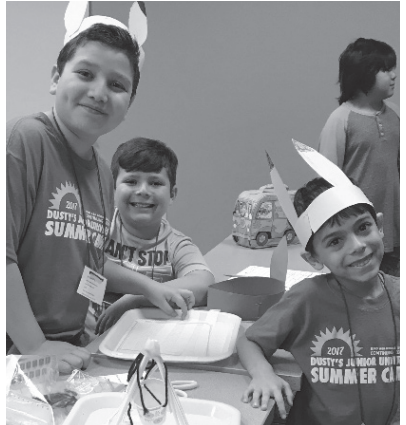

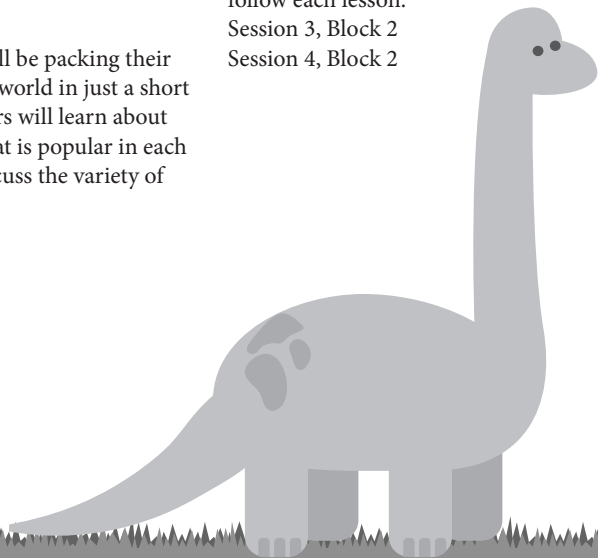

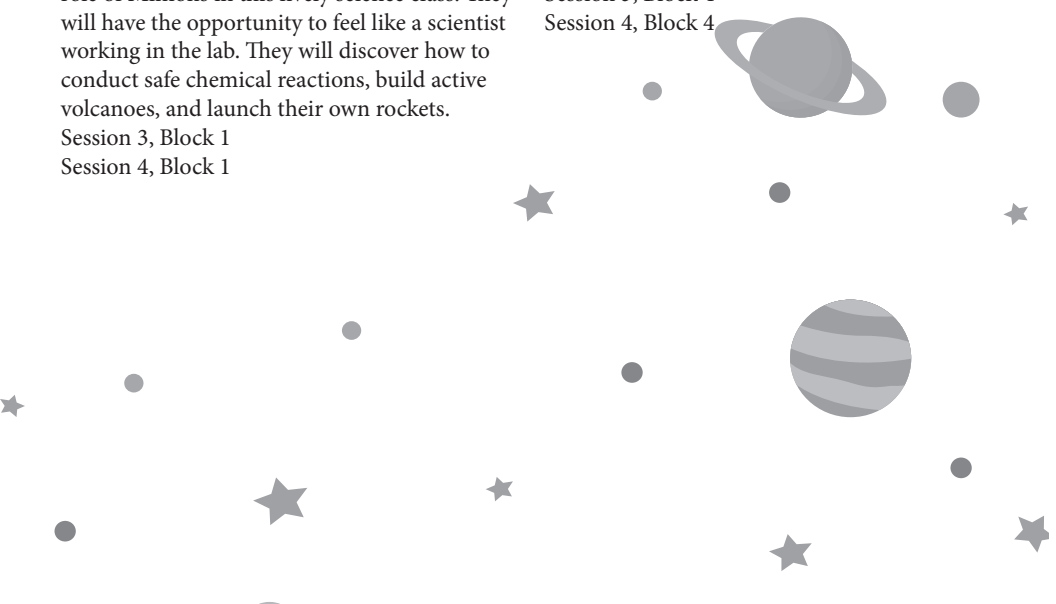
Young Marketers

They will have the chance to partake in a mock interview with their teacher and peers. Different professionals will share their day to day with the campers at the end of each session.

Session 1, Block 3

Youth Leadership

Campers will learn how a leader should engage the community. Our goal is to motivate our campers to make things happen in the community and bring about change. This course will be about setting goals, learning to be responsible, building personal leadership skills and building up confidence in teamwork.

Session 4, Block 1

STEM

STEM is a curriculum based on the idea of educating students in four specific disciplines in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Students will be more proactive in incorporating these subjects into fun enrichment hands on activities and interactive projects such as: constructing a roller coaster, a ferris wheel, and so forth.

Crime Scene Investigators

Fun Fact: the teeth are responsible for identifying a crime scene over 93% of the time! Campers will attempt to solve crime mysteries. These young detectives will learn basic civic laws used in these types of cases, the type of crime-solving equipment law enforcement uses, and techniques in gathering evidence such as fingerprints, hair follicles, and DNA. Did you know volunteering could change someone's life? Did you know that volunteering fills empty spaces on your resume? Did you know volunteering could help you expand your network? Students will be learning about service projects that will benefit them in the future, whether it's volunteer work or programs offered in schools. Session 1, Block 4

Young Marketers

Our children can convince us to do anything... why not turn them into Young Marketers! During their time in class, campers will learn what the world of marketing consists of such as: what it is to sell a product and how to design a marketing campaign. They will accomplish these goals by engaging in tasks such as creating an email campaign, using third party templates and their own photographs. If time permits, students will also have the chance to create their own marketing videos and radio ads, in house. Session 1, Block 2

Food Science

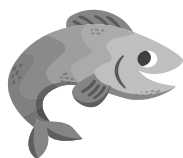
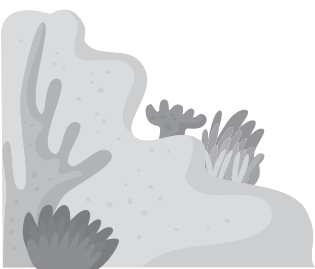
Food Science has been identified as "the application of basic sciences and engineering to study the physical, chemical and biochemical nature of foods and the principles of food processing." This science class will be both fun and tasty! Campers will have the chance to see why food tastes the way it does: Why some food tastes bitter and others don't. AutoCad

Campers will learn the basics of the computer-aided drafting software program (AutoCAD) to create 3D models used by engineers and architects. Such software is used in Engineering classes in High Schools and by Robotics clubs. Students will learn how to create these models, manipulate and scale the objects. Young Architects

Architecture is all around us from the homes we live in to the schools we attend. Manipulating a space for a specific function is extremely crucial in our society. Students will be able to further explore their skills of space manipulation in this class. They will study famous structures and their use, design, and function within society. As the class progresses, they will be involved in designing, building, and presenting their own structures. Besides learning drawing and design, students will further develop critical thinking skills. Session 4, Block 3



Core Class (Geometry & History Boot Camp)

Campers will participate in another Educational Boot Camp in Geometry and History. These important subjects will be presented to them thru fun educational activities. Students will continue to develop their research skills by writing short research papers, making presentations to the class and participating in group discussions. Basic Geometry elements will also be introduced as this area is being tested in their STAAR exam.


