

She was named a fellow of the National Association of College and University Attorneys in June 2001, and in 2010 received the inaugural Georgia Harper Copyright Literacy Award from the Center for Intellectual Property at University of Maryland, University College. Ms. Harper graduated with High Honors from UT-Austin with a B.S. in Education and with Honors from the UT-Austin Law School with a J.D. degree.
